Course Objectives:

The course introduces the students to local architecture in Jordan. The course focuses on the characteristics of building style as a reflection of social, economic, and technological change. The course emphasizes the process of analytical recording and aims at achieving a clear understanding of the construction and typology of buildings as necessary precursor to decision making.

Course Description

- Introduction: A brief history of settlement in Jordan
- Traditional Design and construction in Jordan: Materials, Design, Skills and Craftsmanship.
- Amman City Center: Typologies of architecture and Urban Spaces.
- Villa Architecture in Amman: the current spectrum of styles.
- The use of local materials and suitable techniques: the case of an ancient city.
- Village Architecture in Jordan: Bathan, Hmud, Samad, Main, Alshobak, Tubnah,
- Houses of the Circassian and Chechens.
- Case studies from Arab local architecture.
